Mayor's Message



Got a problem or concern? Who are you going to call? Calling the right people can make a huge difference in the answer, outcome, or solution. If you have an emergency then of course you call 911 for police, fire, or ambulance services. But who should you call if you need a special parking permit or have a question about administrative processes for the city?

City Hall is the administrative branch of our government and are the people who administer the laws and ordinances created by the legislative branch which is the city council. As an example, City Hall not only can issue you a

special parking permit but can also tell you where other areas are around the community besides your street that you can park when you are having an event. They also notify any public safety entities about additional cars in the area in case there is an emergency during your event. If you have an issue with the current ordinance or codes of the City, you can reach out to your elected legislative officials and share your concerns with them. This may affect some change or update to the laws that is long overdue. If you see a noncompliant situation or someone you think is breaking laws (non-emergency) you can reach out to our judicial branch representative, Code Compliance Officer Whit Engle via email at code.compliance@mountainparkgov.com. As always you can call City Hall with any immediate but nonemergency concerns at 770-993-4231. Code Compliance is charged with investigating issues of noncompliance to determine if a warning or citation is warranted to remedy the situation. If a citation is issued, then it becomes a matter for the Judge to decide if in fact there is a guilty party and what the penalty would be. Each branch has its role in making our government work for the people. It is up to the community to let the government know what doesn't work so the legislative branch can change it, the administration branch can implement it and the judicial branch can enforce it. It has been an effective process since the birth of our nation.

Now is the time to start the planning process for any summer events and entertainment. Let City Hall know anything new you would like to see happening in our town or anything you would like to do again. We had a great turnout for the Oktoberfest last year and are discussing another one this Fall. We were able to raise over \$3000.00 for MPVFR and other needed funding for the community. We are excited to start planning some fun events for our city.

The City pool will be opening on Thursday May 26th and will be open daily until Monday September 5th. After September 5th the pool will be open for the weekend only with the final day of the season being Sunday September 11th.

You will be able to purchase season passes at City Hall and all forms required for purchasing passes are attached to the newsletter. We will have daily passes that can be purchased directly from the lifeguard for \$10.00.

Guidelines for the pool are also attached to the newsletter. The guidelines must be initialed by all pass holders and handed in with the Pool Tag Registration.

If you notice discharge to streams, please contact the City of Mountain Park at 404-993-4231. Illicit discharge is any discharge to a storm sewer that is not entirely composed of storm water.

Sec. 105-307. - Prohibition of illicit discharges.

No person shall throw, drain, or otherwise discharge, cause, or allow others under its control to throw, drain, or otherwise discharge into the city separate storm sewer system any pollutants or waters containing any pollutants, other than stormwater.

The following discharges are exempt from the prohibition provision above:

- (1) Water line flushing performed by a government agency, other potable water sources, landscape irrigation, diverted stream flows, rising ground water, ground water infiltration to storm drains, uncontaminated pumped ground water, foundation or footing drains (not including active groundwater dewatering systems), crawl space pumps, air conditioning condensation, springs, natural riparian habitat or wetland flows, and any other water source not containing pollutants;
- (2) Discharges or flows from firefighting, and other discharges specified in writing by the city as being necessary to protect public health and safety;
- (3) The prohibition provision above shall not apply to any non-stormwater discharge permitted under an NPDES permit or order issued to the discharger and administered under the authority of the state and the Federal Environmental Protection Agency, provided that the discharger is in full compliance with all requirements of the permit, waiver, or order and other applicable laws and regulations, and provided that written approval has been granted for any discharge to the (municipal/county) separate storm sewer system.

Sec. 105-149. - Prohibited pollutants.

- (a) It is unlawful to discharge, or allow to be discharged, pollutants and contaminated water into any:
 - (1) Public street, highway, right-of-way;
 - (2) Stormwater conveyance or facility; and
 - (3) Other public/private property that is a part of or drains to the municipal storm sewer system.
- (b) Pollutants that are prohibited include, but are not limited to:
 - (1) Petroleum products including but not limited to oil, gasoline, grease, fuel oil and heating oil;
 - (2) Trash or debris;
 - (3) Pet wastes;
 - (4) Chemicals;
 - (5) Paints;
 - (6) Steam cleaning wastes;
 - (7) Washing of fresh concrete for cleaning and/or finishing purposes or to expose aggregates;
 - (8) Laundry wastes;
 - (9) Soaps:
 - (10) Pesticides, herbicides, or fertilizers;
 - (11) Sanitary sewage;
 - (12) Heated water;
 - (13) Chlorinated water or chlorine, except as exempted in section 105-148;
 - (14) Degreasers and/or solvents;
 - (15) Bark and other fibrous material;
 - (16) Antifreeze or other automotive products;
 - (17) Lawn clippings, leaves, or branches;
 - (18) Animal carcasses;
 - (19) Silt;
 - (20) Acids or alkalis;
 - (21) Recreational vehicle wastes;
 - (22) Dyes (without prior permission of the department); and
 - (23) Construction materials.
